# 1985 President's Report.

The past year has been an excellent one for the S.L.S.L.S. Co - Op. Ltd., a succession of fine well attended public running days has resulted in a very satisfactory accumulation of club funds to meet our ever increasing running costs and to finance the improvements to our track and grounds.

Once again a very special thanks to the ladies who ensure the kiosk operates so successfully each public running day and for their organisation of the Christmas Party.

Charity Days were held for the Crowle Home in September and the Spastic Centre in March, both days were fine and financially successful, unfortunately the fastic Centre day had to be terminated at about 4.00 pm due to the high temperature and strong winds which broke some limbs from trees and made the grounds unsafe.

The Easter Convention at Lake Macquarie was attended by a large number of our our members and after due consideration of our delegates report on the proceedings of the A.A.L.S. meeting the Board decided to withdraw from A.A.L.S. This decision received the support of a large majority of members attending the June special general meeting.

Inter - Club visits were made to the Sydney Society of Model Engineers and Blue Mountains Railway Society Co-Op Ltd., Members also visited John Hagan's  $7\frac{1}{4}$ " railway at Duffys Forest and John Green's 5 " gauge railway at Yarramundi.

Seating for the public was greatly improved with the donation of eighteen concrete and timber park seats which have been placed around the grounds.

The reconstructed 5" ground level turntable, steaming bays, unloading hoist and swing bridge are now in service and subsequent connection to the elevated track will complete this project.

The signal Box and its electrical system is proceeding towards completion after many years work by a small group of members.

Insallation of the new light poles with underground wiring is proceeding and should be completed within the next year.

Six new locomotives appeared on the Societies tracks in steam this year with a number of new locomotives in various stages of construction indicating that our Society is continuing to grow.

The southern boundry fence will be replaced in the near future now that funds are available, other projects include the extension of the carriage shed, installation of the longer stub points beam and a suitable design for a new footbridge over the tracks for the public to enter the grounds.


## CHARITY DAY

#### A Railway in the country.



On a Saturday late in July the SLSLS were invited by Mr. John Green to visit his property in the foothills of the Blue Mts., the attraction being John's extensive 5"gauge ground level railway system. The day was rather good weather wise for mid winter and a reasonable number of members availed themselves of the invitation. Locomotives present were Eric Holmes R4, Barry Tulloch's D 50 class and Jeff Sorenson's C 30T.

The track, some 3000ft. in length has a return loop at each end gives a run of almost a mile from the starting point and back to the start facing the same way.

The railway includes a turntable with round house facilities and a steaming bay. The yard provides passing, shunting and storage sidings. Running from the yard to the east the track skirts the side of the house and then swings down through two reverse curves to cross the driveway. After running parallel to the drive the track turns to cross the drive again then heads off around the dam. You should see the size of the carp that lives in the dam. There is a passing loop on the far side of the dam and the track also crosses a steel girder bridge. On the reverse curves there is a very nice wooden trestle viaduct.

Once back through the yard the track swings through a very deep cutting that will eventually be made into a tunnel;

While I was there Eric Holmes and Jeff Sorenson ran passenger services with Barry Tulloch's D 50 class hauled a train of 32 mixed goods wagons + guards van. This train looked truely magnificent as it climbed at near scale speed back up the bank after its run around the dam, Barry had set the regulator and disembarked to watch from trackside.

John has a number of scale buildings in the yard area these give a very realistic effect. At times on the track John likes to have running sessions where only scale trains are run even to a timetable.

Some of the members enjoyed a B.B.Q. or picnic lunch and I am sure that all who were there enjoyed the day as much as my son Peter and I did.
