Twentyfive Years ago:

This is dated September 25th 1957 and despite the intervening 25 years could well be an example to us now of good planning, it is not possible to reproduce the original documents but suffice to say that the details left nothing to chance. It was planned to sell 1500 tickets for rides at 3d for two laps totaling 800', admission at the gate was 2/-, with current inflation we are now charging a lot less. There were eleven engines rostered for duty with others on display, drivers included A & S McKellar, T & B Hurst, R.Styles, G.Floyd, Clive Gunning, J.Austen & R Bowman, among other members mentioned were Cec. Gunning, C.S.McKellar, J.Hurst snr. R.Clark, L.Rawlings, W.Shellshear, S.Iredale, R.Brown, R.Code, J.Stewart. F.McIvor & W.Jones. A balance sheet for the same period showed assets of £166.17.0 of which £138.16.8 covered track construction and rails.

Organising on a National basis:

Members will be aware that the annual meetings that are now held on the Easter Sunday morning originated in 1966 at Ryde with the object of what is now our A.M.B.S.C. Boiler Codes, this was an object of which we can be proud not only because of the successful manner in which it is now operating but in that we were the first country in the world to achieve a uniform standard in regard to boiler safety. In recent years our meetings have started to cover other aspects of our hobby which can also be brought into line so that interclub running can be enjoyed to the best advantage and also that other items of safety can be rationalised, this all suggests that we should establish this meeting as a National Association of all our clubs with a national secretary to keep things moving, a committee would be formed with the secretary and a representitive from each club. Without taking up too much space here it is intended to submit a motion this Easter to establish such an association and it is hoped that unanimous agreement will be obtained, in this regard all clubs have received a copy of the motion and to date favourable reaction has resulted. The matter will be debated in full at our next club meeting to be held on March 6th so if you have any thoughts on the subject COME ALONG.

IT'S A BOMB *****

We would not like to describe your loco as a Bomb, the word is often quite derogatory, in this case the word is used in its true meaning and the following figures provided by Stan Childs more than make the point:

The hidden or potential energy pent up within our miniature loco boilers is considerable, and if expressed in terms of a known explosive, such as CORDITE, the amount of energy is astonishing.

Thus one cubic inch of water weighs 0.036 lb. and when at a steam pressure of 100 p.s.i.g. in a boiler, it will contain 41.85 British Thermal Units (B.T.U.) and as each B.T.U. is equal to 778 foot pounds of energy, then one cubic inch of water would contain a potential energy of 41.85 x 778 = 32,562 ft.lbs. or 14.534 ft.tons.

The potential energy in one pound of CORDITE is quoted at 77 ft.tons therefore the energy within a 1 1/8" scale N.S.W.G.R. C-38 class boiler containing 2.75 Imp. Gals. at half glass and steam at 100 p.s.i.g. could be 14.534 x 762 (2.75 gal.) = 11077 ft.tons equal to 143.9 lb. of CORDITE.

Thus careful and thorough boiler inspections are a necessity if our hobby is to retain its popularity and prestige. S.L.N.Childs.
