

Presidents Report:

Gentlemen, it is with pleasure that I present to you the 27th Annual Report of the Sydney Live Steam Locomotive Society for the year ending 30-4-75.

The major project during the year has been the rebuilding of the elevated track. Dismantling of the old track started in October last year and was completed by the end of the year, this resulted in increased interest in the rebuilding programme which has proceeded at a greater rate since Christmas. A few posts and beams were still to be installed on the top curve and on the western side only (since completed Ed.). The elevated roundhouse in being rebuilt in steel throughout, catering for  $2\frac{1}{2}$ ",  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " and 5" gauges with one arrival road and one departure road together with twelve stabling roads.

Work on the ground level track includes an extended loco road and a siding at the bottom end just beyond the overhead bridge.

Ground maitenance continues to remain good due in greater part to the poisoning programme, and to a lesser part to the members responce, I notice that some members are failing to honour their obligation in this department. The lawnmower fleet stands at five 18" machines and one 24" power driven machine, the maintenance of which is carried out by Peter Shiels.

Presidents Annual Report cntd.

During the year one new locomotive has been commissioned to traffic, an 2.8.0 in 5" gauge built and owned by Reg. Wood. In addition three more locos have appeared owned by new members these are: Princess Royal 4.6.2. in  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " gauge by Jack Esdaile, Tich 0.4.0. in  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " gauge by Jim Hyde and 36 class 4.6.0. in  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " gauge by Don Jones.

An interclub visit was held at the Blue Mountains Railway Society on 26th October '74, this was in conjunction with their 10th birthday celebrations, as with previous visits of this nature it was well patronised and a good time was had by all, for the first time without rain.

Membership stands at fiftyone, the first time that the half century has been reached, there are 32 full members, 15 associate members and 4 affiliate members. During the year Brian Kilgour and Bill Edgecombe were transfered from associate to full member. New members accepted into the society were Jack Esdaile Bill hamilton, Jim Hyde, Don Jones, Ron Moffett, Jeff Sorenson and Michael Tyson.

Public support on our open days continues to be satisfactory although there has been a noticable decline since the withdrawal of the elevated track, the sale of soft drinks and afternoon teas has been very good during the year and again sincere thanks to the ladies who have given up their Saturday afternoons to perform this service.

Two charity days were held, one for the Crowle Home on 19-10-74 and one for the Ryde Lantern Club on 2.11.74, both days being well supported by the public.

In conclusion Gentlemen, I sincerely thank all those members whose time and effort throughout the year has further advanced our society and made my task that much easier.



Club Movement in the South:::: by Jim Ranford. During my annual visit to South Australia this year I had the pleasure of visiting the new grounds of the Adelaide Miniature Steam Railway Society at Regency Road Prospect. This young club is an 'off shoot' from S.A.S.M.E.E. ( you'l get shot if you say 'Break-away'), its members comprise 5" gauge members of the latter who are desirous of running 5" ground level but are unable to get this facility at Millswood due to space limitations. I was fotunate to attend a meeting of S.A.S.M.E.E. where I was able to renew acquaintances with dozens of friends there too many to mention names and I dont want to offend by risking chance omissions. A most gratifying and impromptu motion was moved and passed to hold a benefit day to assist the new club, to me, this was a wonderful gesture and should dispel any ideas of a wrangle within the movement in S.A., it is an excellent example to follow. The amount of work that has taken place on this two acrs site since work began last July is quite staggering and is a credit to those nineteen or so members involved. Trackwork is taking shape and to date approximately 1,200ft. of the proposed 2,500 ft has been laid together with points and a most facinating. double slip that has to be seen to be appreciated, I'M aware that some people saw it in Maurie Turners workshop but it is now in operation, makes me feel like building another 5" gauge loco. The turntable was being installed when I was there and countless hours have been spent in workshops on this and other equipment like cheese-head point levers, hydraulic point controls and signalling devices etc. Completed, so far, is the truck shed, the ground floor portion of the signal cabin and all perimeter fencing gates and entrances. An Rx looo wheel has been mounted on the Regency Road frontage with a sign "Railway Park" erected alogside. Footings have been poured for the clubroom and toilet complex. Those who knew Grayson Calvert one of S.A.S.M.E.E.s stalwarts and who accompanied Maurie Turner to the convention at Easter will be sorry to hear that he passed away quietly at his home less than twelve hours after they returned to Adelaide, suitable gestures and expressions were made at the club meeting. To any of our fraternity visiting Adelaide I can strongly commend a visit to A.M.S.R.S. another name to be added to the list of "Loco" people, their President is Murray Sambell, Secretary John Wakefield and Treasurer Maurie Turner, any of these gentlemen would be delighted to welcome visitors.
