

Colo Vale Visit. "Windy Ridge" provided an idyllic bushland setting when 17 members and their families visited there on Sunday, 2nd May. Accompanying them were 7 locomotives which were run on the fine 5" gauge ground level track. To find previous mention of such visits to Colo Vale we have to go back to Newsletters of 1982 -83 when NSWGR models seem to have predominated. This visit was represented by TGR "R", VGR "S", WAGR "V" and of course NSWGR was not to be out done with the presence of 30T and 35 classes. Along with Lionel Pascoe's locomotive there was a certain "39" circulating all day. Additional interest was provided by the presence of the remote, cable controlled 3801.

The picturesque layout has a roundhouse with turntable, storage sidings, points and colourlight signalling operated from a signalbox which even had genuine NSWGR signalbox phones on the wall. The station area has water columns and two attractive platform lights of a bygone era. The route passes through a mixture of natural bushland, cleared areas, across a dam, and with

varying grades made the drive and ride both challenging and interesting. Even to sit by the still waters of the dam with its reflections of bushland and trains on a glorious autumn day wasn't hard to take.

**Vacuum Brakes.** Brian Kilgour is working on an investigation of a system of vacuum brakes that could be adopted by the Society. Based on a system published in Model Engineer, that has been in use for many years Brian is looking at making some improvements and when sea going activiticallow will fit out his Nigel Gresley and riding trucks. Brian will also, when on dry land, try not to get involved in sorting out dog fights. I hope the arm has fully recovered.

At the Grounds. As many members are aware the two large old gum trees were removed some time back. At the direction of Ryde Council two trees of a specific species of gum have been planted to replace them.

Work is progressing well on the ground level round house. Retaining walls are complete and the drainage is as good as finished. Excavations have been completed and the form work is well under way. Weather permitting it is proposed to pour concrete on the following Saturday mornings; May 22nd, June 5th and 12th. starting time 7.30 to 8.00 am. Lots of help required. Warwick Allison has been working on the rewiring of the public entrance gates (cyclone mesh) and refurbishing the sign with some professional help from Paul Taffa's brother

#### Duty and Gate Roster.








VR. "S" CLASS
